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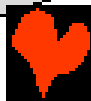
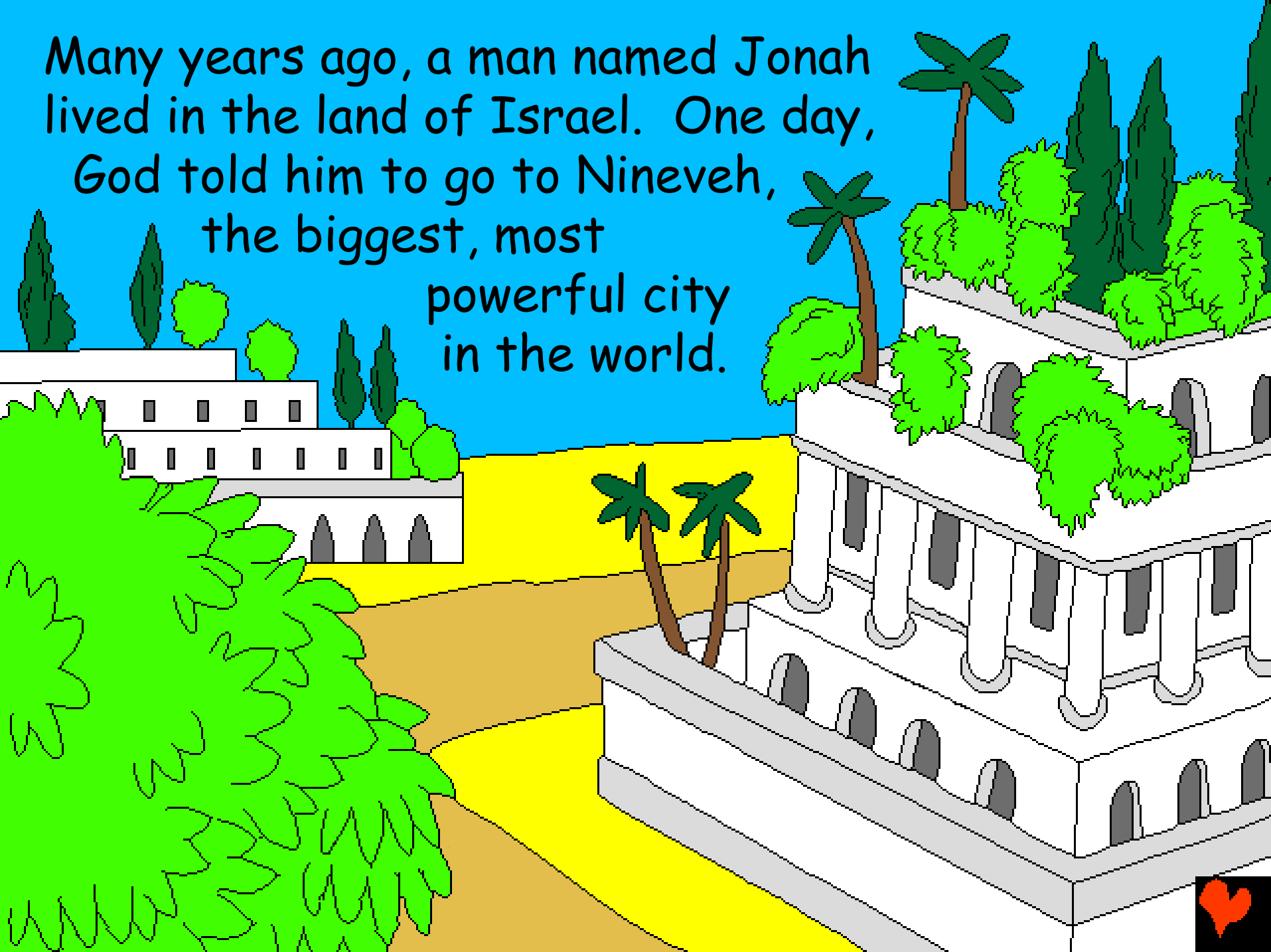
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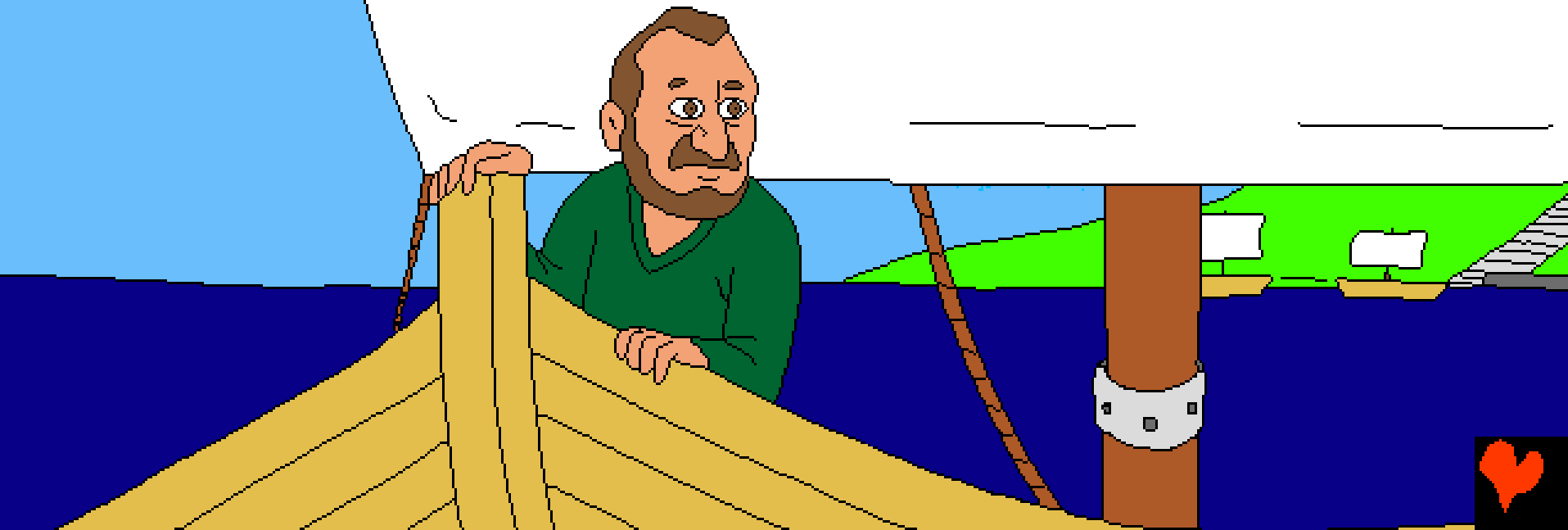
Many years ago, a man named Jonah lived in the land of Israel. One day, God told him to go to Nineveh, the biggest, most powerful city in the world.



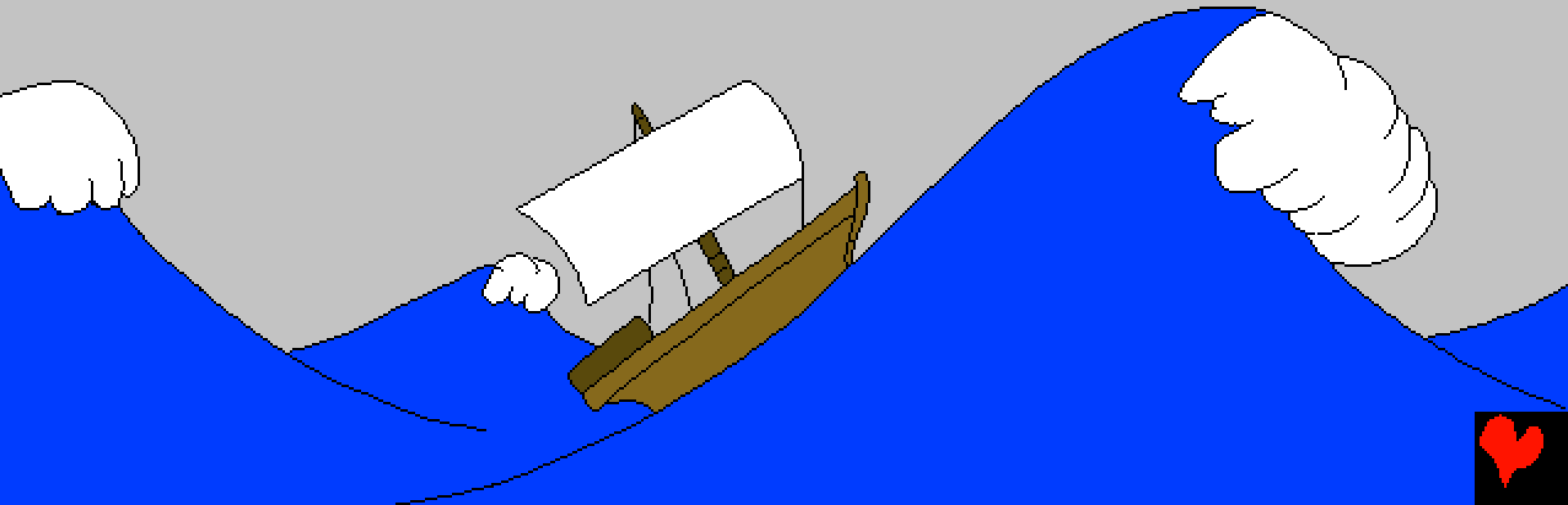
Jonah was to warn all the people there that God knew how wicked they were.

The storm got worse and worse. Terrified, the sailors prayed to their gods and threw all the cargo overboard to lighten the ship. But nothing helped.

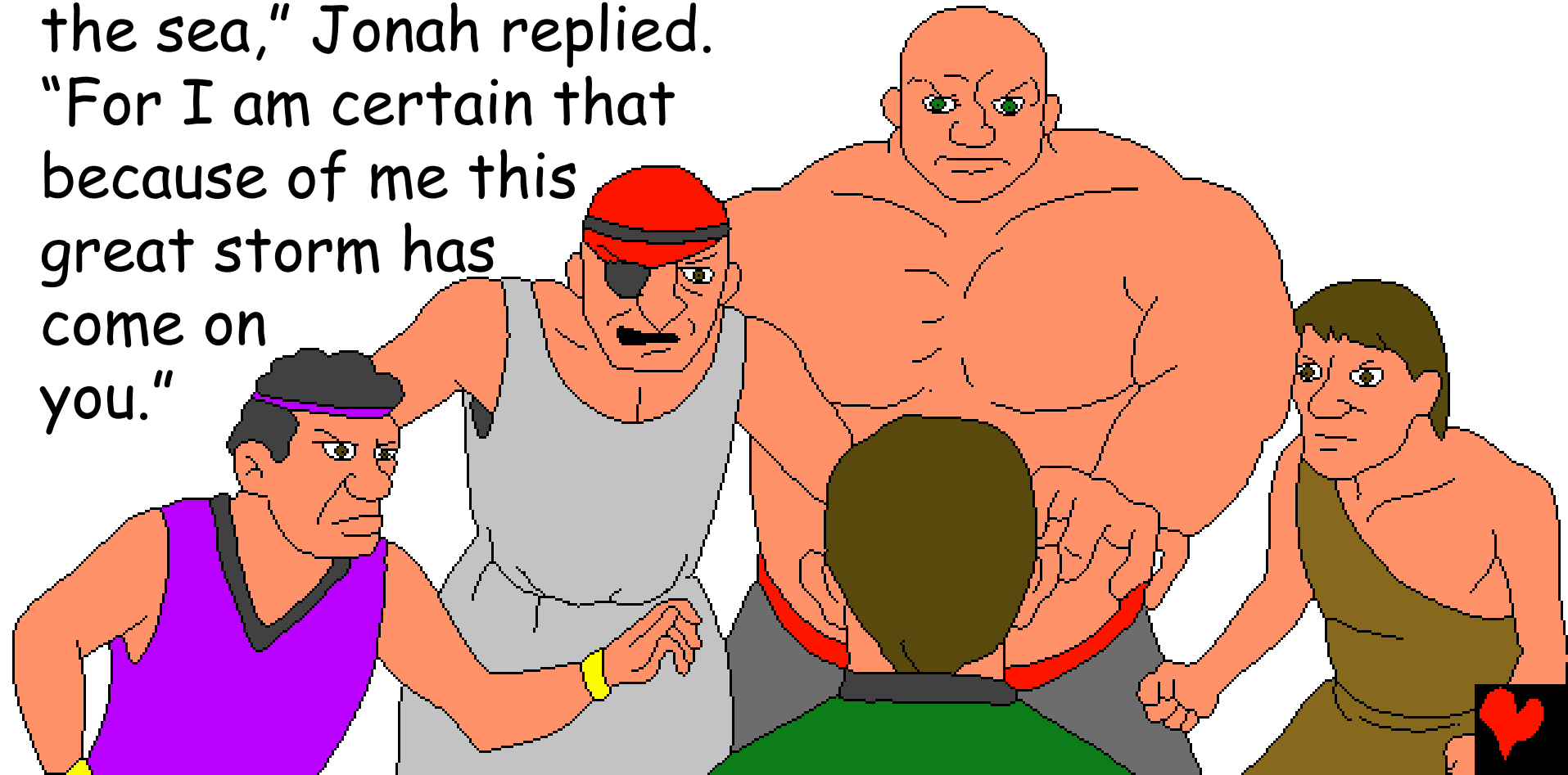


Jonah was the only person on board who wasn't praying. Instead, he was lying down inside the ship, sound asleep.

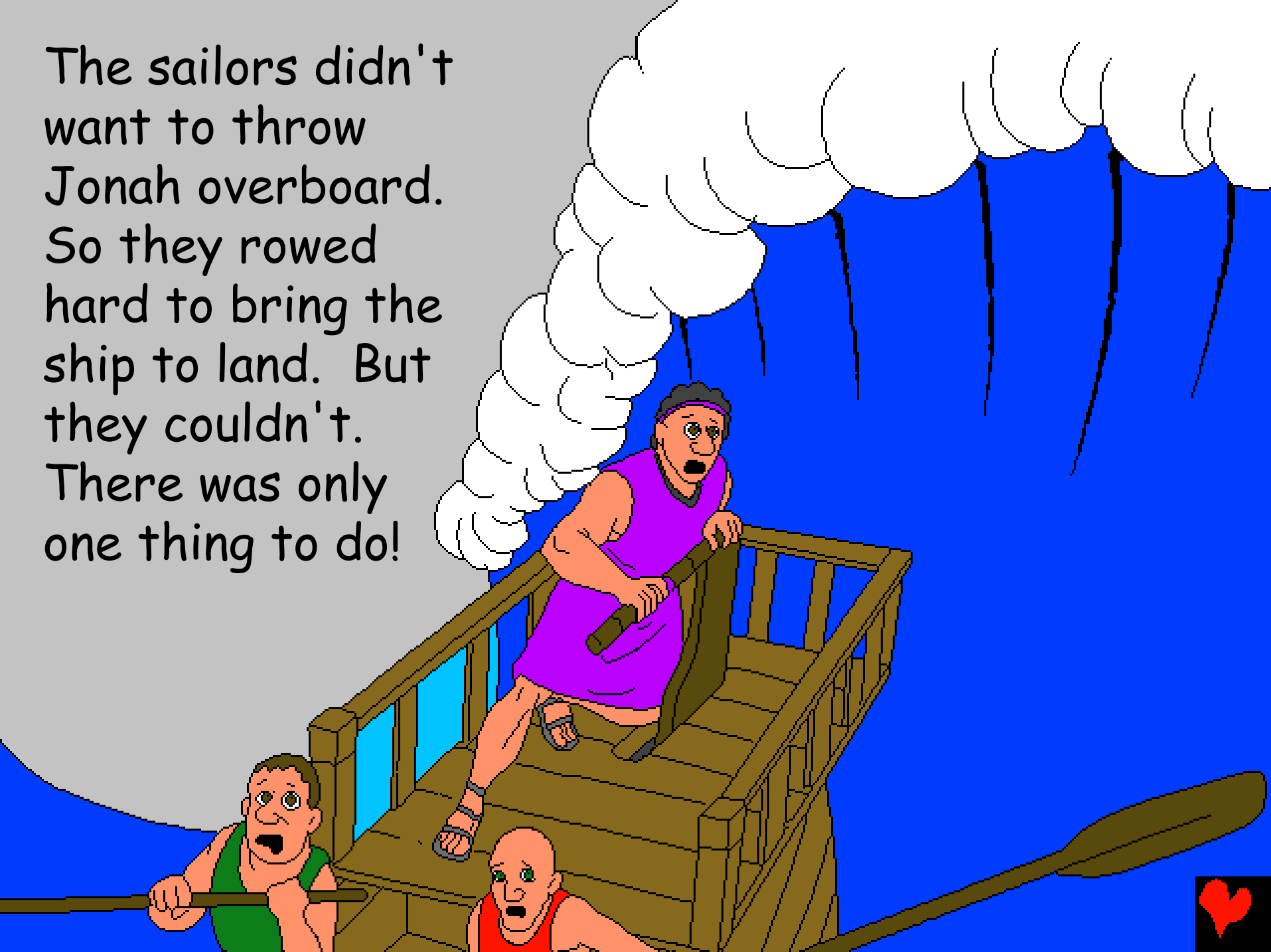
The ship's captain found him. "What are you doing sleeping? Get up! Say a prayer to your God! Maybe God will think of us, so that we will not be destroyed."

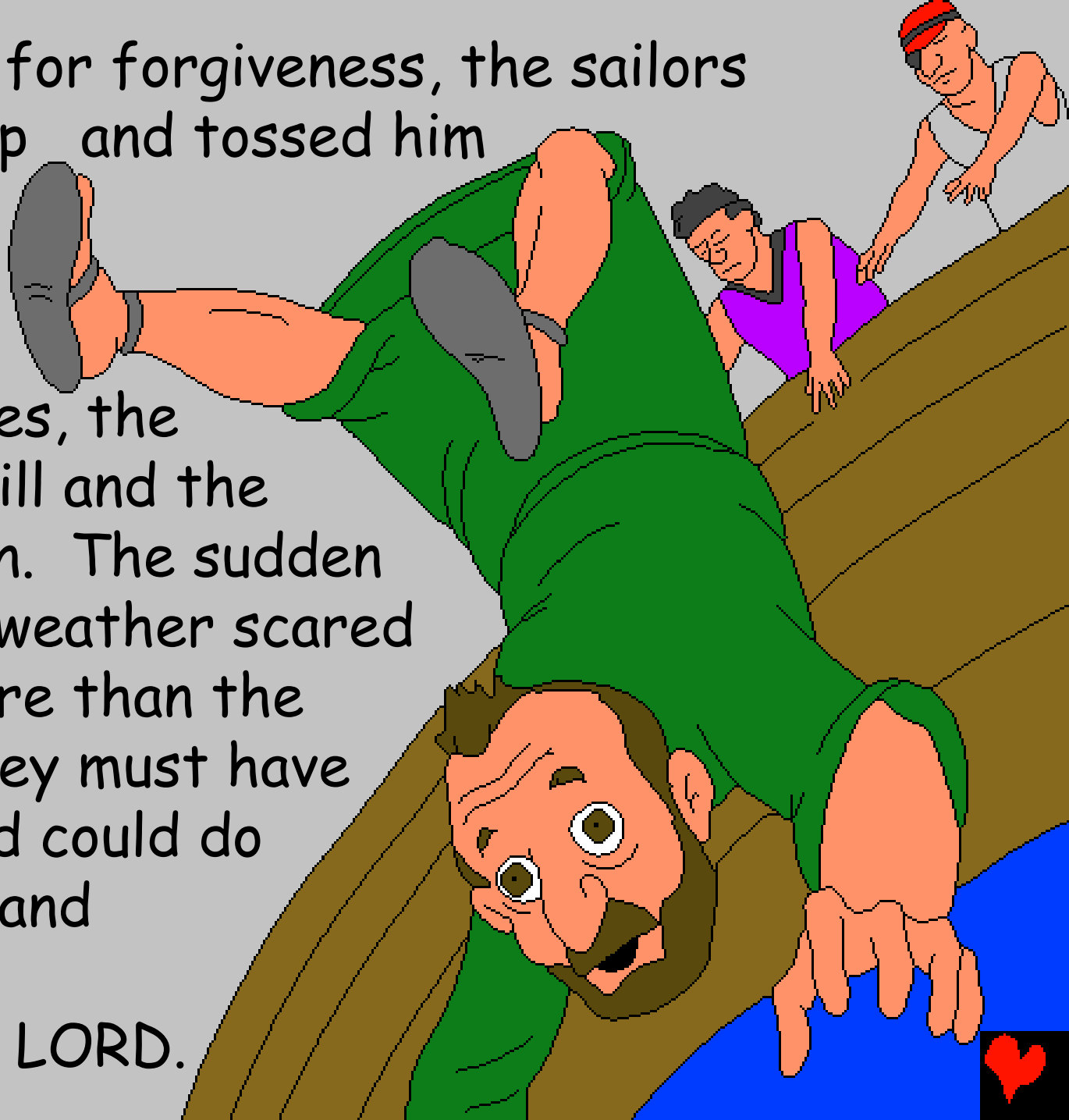


The sailors didn't want to throw Jonah overboard. So they rowed hard to bring the ship to land. But they couldn't. There was only one thing to do!



After praying for forgiveness, the sailors lifted Jonah up and tossed him over the side.

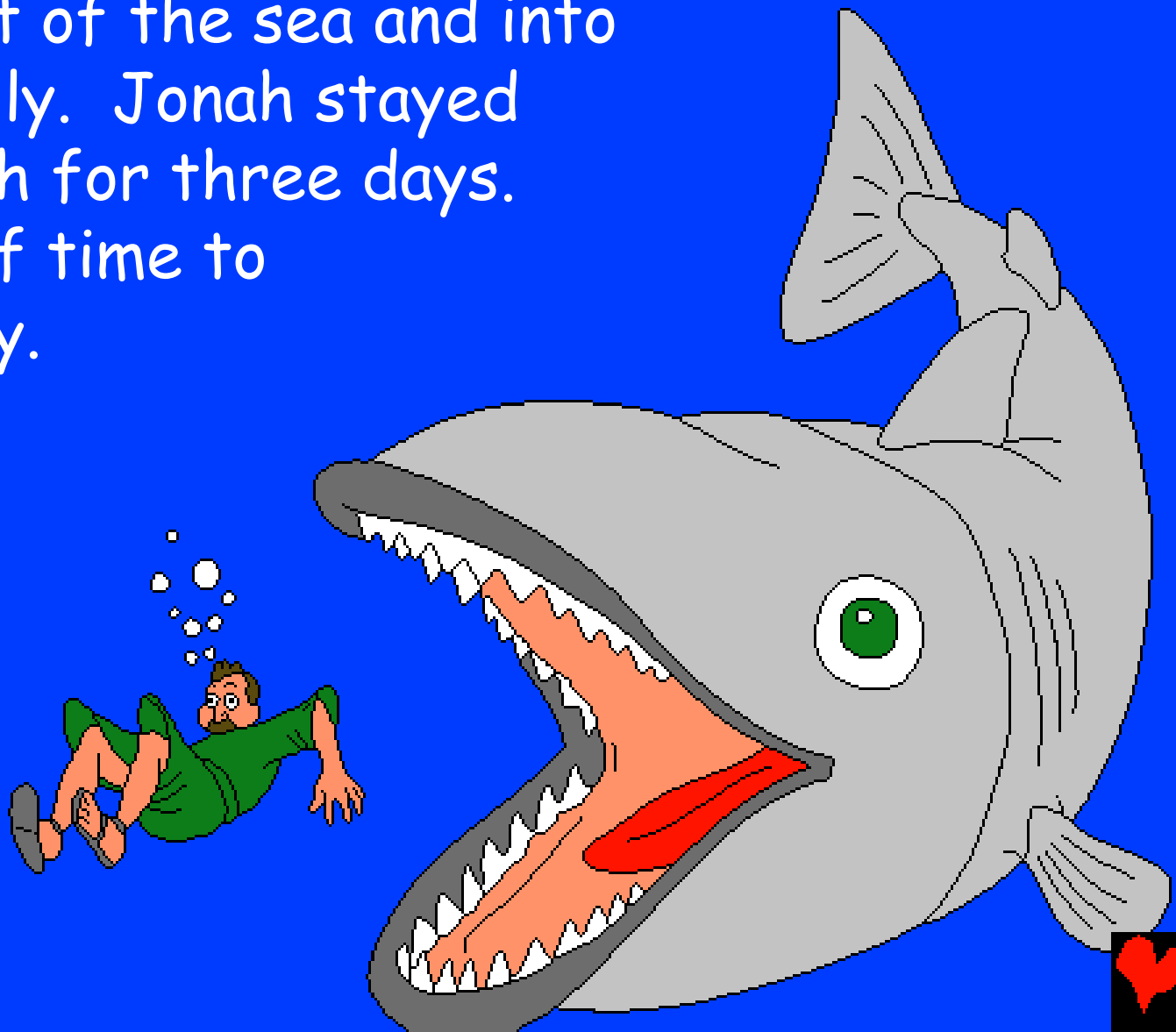

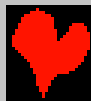

Jonah was so angry with God that he said, "Take my life from me; for death is better for me than life."



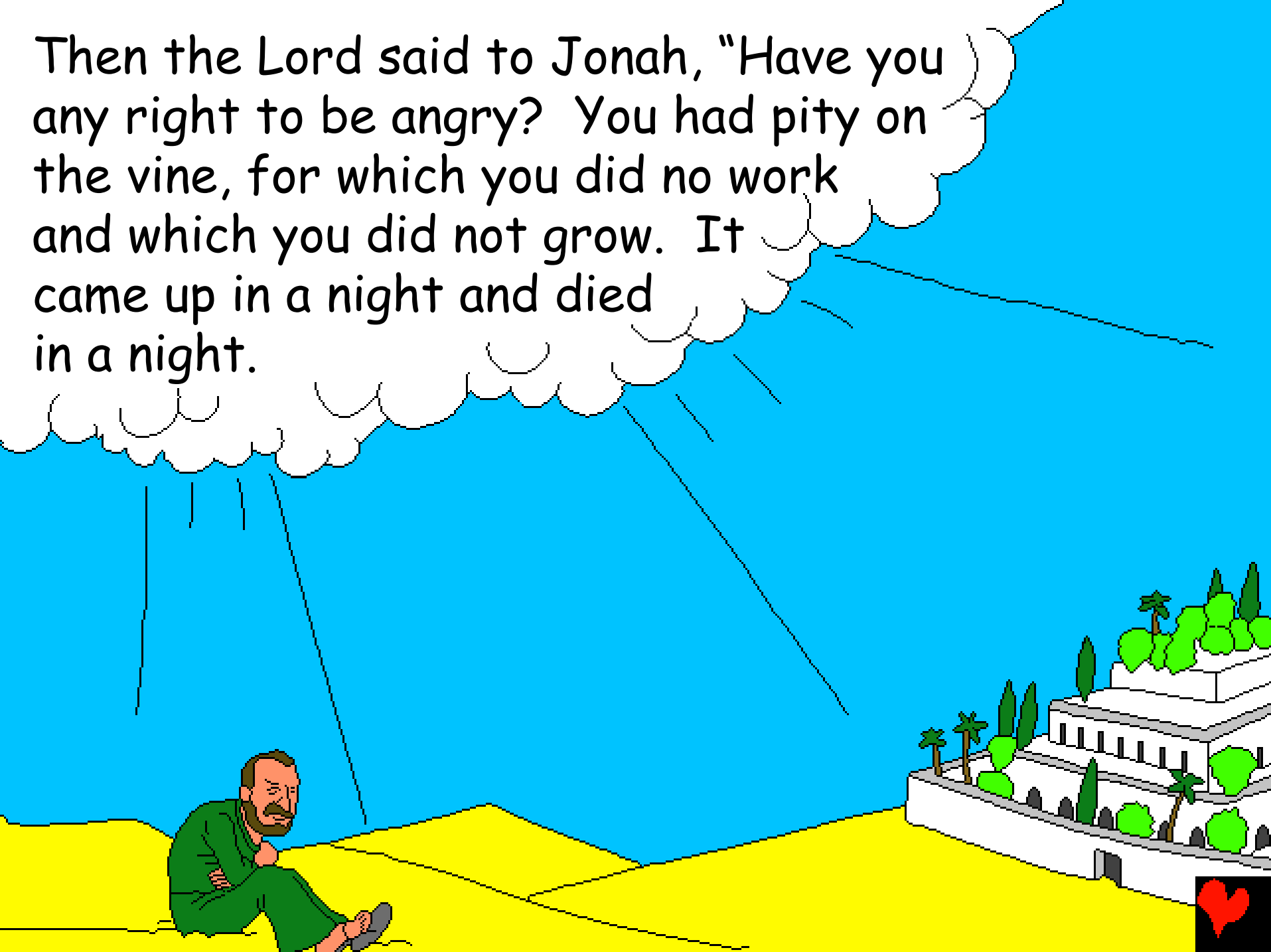
